AlburyCity is delighted to bring you the 2010 Write around the Murray festival – a celebration of writing, illustrating and storytelling.

This year the festival occurs in Spring – the perfect season for authors and presenters to bring us their stories. To celebrate our first Spring festival, the innovative *Spatial Stories* environmental storytelling project will take us beyond the walls of the LibraryMuseum into QEII Square.

Author Chris Hammer will open the festival with a discussion of his book, *The River – A Journey through the Murray-Darling Basin*. Albury is a city with strong historical, emotional and economic ties to the Murray River, so Chris's book, which

tells the story of the endangered river system, the people who live along it and those who will be most impacted by its demise, will be of great interest to us all.

Award-winning ABC journalist Chris Masters; co-writer of the *Underbelly* true crime series, Andrew Rule; fiction writers Melina Marchetta (*Looking for Alibrandi*), Carole Wilkinson, (*Dragonkeeper* series) and Scott Monk (*Raw*); eco-travel writer Louise Southerden; poets Emilie Zoey Baker, Nathan Curnow and Derek Motion; blogger Angela Meyer; zine collector Dr Anna Poletti; and author and illustrator Narelle Oliver will all join our program this year to give us fresh insights into all aspects of writing, illustrating and storytelling.

The festival will finish with its first ever book club. Be sure to join Cate Kennedy and *The Age* book editor and ABC *First Tuesday Book Club* regular Jason Steger in a discussion of Cate's book *The World Beneath*.

A strong contingent of local authors will join our award-winning and nationally renowned guests in the public and schools programs.

There is truly something for everybody in this year's program. Come along and celebrate with us at the 2010 Write around the Murray festival.

Emilie Zoey Baker is a published and award-winning poet and slam champion. She has performed around the world and is a state coordinator for the Australian Poetry Slam.

Krista Bell is an award-winning author of 23 titles for young readers. Her latest book is *Peeking Ducks*, illustrated by Sally Rippin.

Susan Berran lives in the tiny town of Bethanga with her partner and daughter, and loves to encourage kids – particularly reluctant readers – to read.

Sue Brunskill is a co-author of *A Garden Guide for Albury Wodonga*. Sue teaches Permaculture and Natural Area Restoration and Management at the National Environment Centre in Thurgoona.

Nathan Curnow's latest book, *The Ghost Poetry Project*, is based upon his stays at 10 haunted sites around the country, including Port Arthur and Norfolk Island. He is the winner of the 2010 Josephine Ulrick Poetry Prize.

Louise D'Arcy from Yackandandah was the winner of *The Age* Short Story Competition in 2009 and a past winner of the AlburyCity Short Story Competition.

Barry Dorr's passion for publishing Australian books that make a difference has not diminished since he began publishing in 1983. Barry lives and breathes the profession he loves.

Dagmara Gieysztor is a writer, illustrator and puppet maker. She also makes hand-made books and runs workshops on this subject.

David Gilbey is Senior Lecturer in Australian Literature, Children's Literature, 19th Century Literature and Creative Writing at Charles Sturt University. He was instrumental in the establishment of Booranga Writers' Centre in Wagga Wagga.

Chris Hammer is a journalist who has reported from six continents for SBS World News and Dateline. *The River: A Journey through the Murray-Darling Basin*, released earlier this year, is his first book.

Nicholas Hutcheson travelled to Antarctica aboard the ship *Aurora Australis*, visiting Casey, Davis and Mawson stations. Throughout the voyage, Nicholas's drawings and observations were followed online by school children and adults.

Cate Kennedy is the author of two poetry collections (*Joyflight* and *Signs of Other Fires*), a travel memoir (*Sing and Don't Cry: A Mexican Journal*), a short story collection (*Dark Roots*) and a novel (*The World Beneath*).

Melina Marchetta is the author of the much-loved multi-award-winning novel, *Looking for Alibrandi*, as well as *Saving Francesca*, *On the Jellicoe Road*, *Finnikin of the Rock* and the recently released novel *The Piper's Son*.

Melinda Marengo is a founding member of Write Friends. She is author of a self-published memoir, *And So I Did* (2006). She also writes poetry and is working on the sequel to her memoir.

Chris Masters retains the record for being the longest-serving reporter on Australia's longest-running public affairs television program – *Four Corners*. He is the author of three books: *Inside Story*, *Not for Publication* and *Jonestown*. *Jonestown* has won three awards, including Biography of the Year.

Nick McKenzie is an investigative journalist with *The Age*. He has twice won the prestigious Walkley Award for journalism.

Angela Meyer's fiction, reviews, articles and interviews have appeared in wide circulation across Australia. She is a former acting editor of *Bookseller + Publisher* and is well known online for her blog, *LiteraryMinded*.

Scott Monk is a journalist, subeditor and author of five novels for young people including *Raw*, *Beyond the Knock-Knock Door* and *BoyzR'Us*. His first book was published when he was just 21.

Derek Motion is a poet and performer. He was the winner of the Overland Judith Wright Prize in 2009. He recently had poems published in *The Best Australian Poems 2009*.

Narelle Oliver is the author and illustrator of a number of award-winning picture books. Her most recent book, *Fox and Fine Feathers* is currently shortlisted for the Children's Book Council of Australia Picture Book of the Year Award.

Dr Anna Poletti is one of the curators of PechaKucha Wagga Wagga. She lectures in English at Charles Sturt University and is making a fanzine about newsreaders.

Kate Rotherham is a social worker and mother of four who writes when normal people are asleep. She won the 2008 AlburyCity Short Story Competition and the 2009 Booranga Writers Fiction Prize.

Andrew Rule has variously written, co-written, edited and published many books, including the *Underbelly* true crime series and the *Chopper* series. As a senior writer for *The Age*, he has won numerous industry awards including a Gold Walkley.

Greg Shapley is a media and sound

artist who has an interest in using detritus (stuff normally considered rubbish) to make kinetic audio art.

Louise Southerden is an award-winning freelance travel writer who specialises in the great outdoors. She was named Travel Writer of the Year by the Australian Society of Travel Writers in both 2008 and 2009.

Jason Steger is the books editor of *The Age* and a regular panellist on ABC TV's *First Tuesday Book Club*. Jason began his career as a sports journalist in 1980 and eventually shifted into business journalism, working for *The Financial Times* in London.

Harata Syme has been writing poetry for the last couple of years.

She is based in Wagga Wagga. She has entered a few slams, and her spoken word work incorporates a mix of different styles.

Di Thomas joined *The Border Mail* in March 1998. She has served as rural editor, senior reporter and chief-of-staff. In August 2008 she was appointed deputy editor.

Ian Trevaskis is a full-time writer based in Tallangatta whose children's books are published in Australia, New Zealand and the USA. *Medusa Stone*, published in 2009, is the first novel in the *Hopscotch* series.

Yandell Walton is an accomplished projection installation artist

exhibiting regularly in galleries and non-traditional public spaces in her home country, Australia, and internationally.

Jo Wilson-Ridley is a writer, poet and spoken-word performer based in Coleambally. Jo's work is described as domestic satire inspired by a bush change and parenthood.

Carole Wilkinson writes historical fiction and non-fiction. Best known for her award-winning *Dragonkeeper* trilogy, her latest book, *Sugar Sugar*, is her first novel for young adults.
